


Down the trail, at the fork keep left and walk until you see a long log surround by fallen black tree on the right of the trail.




My plot today was very green, lots of moss has been growing. There were also lots of bugs which I think were mosquitoes and maybe gnats.




We then heard many eagle calls in the distance which turned out to be a fight in the eagles nest between the eagle parents and a hawk trying to attack the juvenile eagle. After hearing the eagles we walked to the area by the barns and near the water we were able to clearly see the nest and the two eagles, one was standing on a patch of land in the water and the other was perched in the tree with their nest. As we kept walking we saw and heard many more birds. We got to see some crows, coots, and sandpipers. While leaving we also saw a northern flicker in a tree, a peregrine falcon, and a red-tailed hawk.
