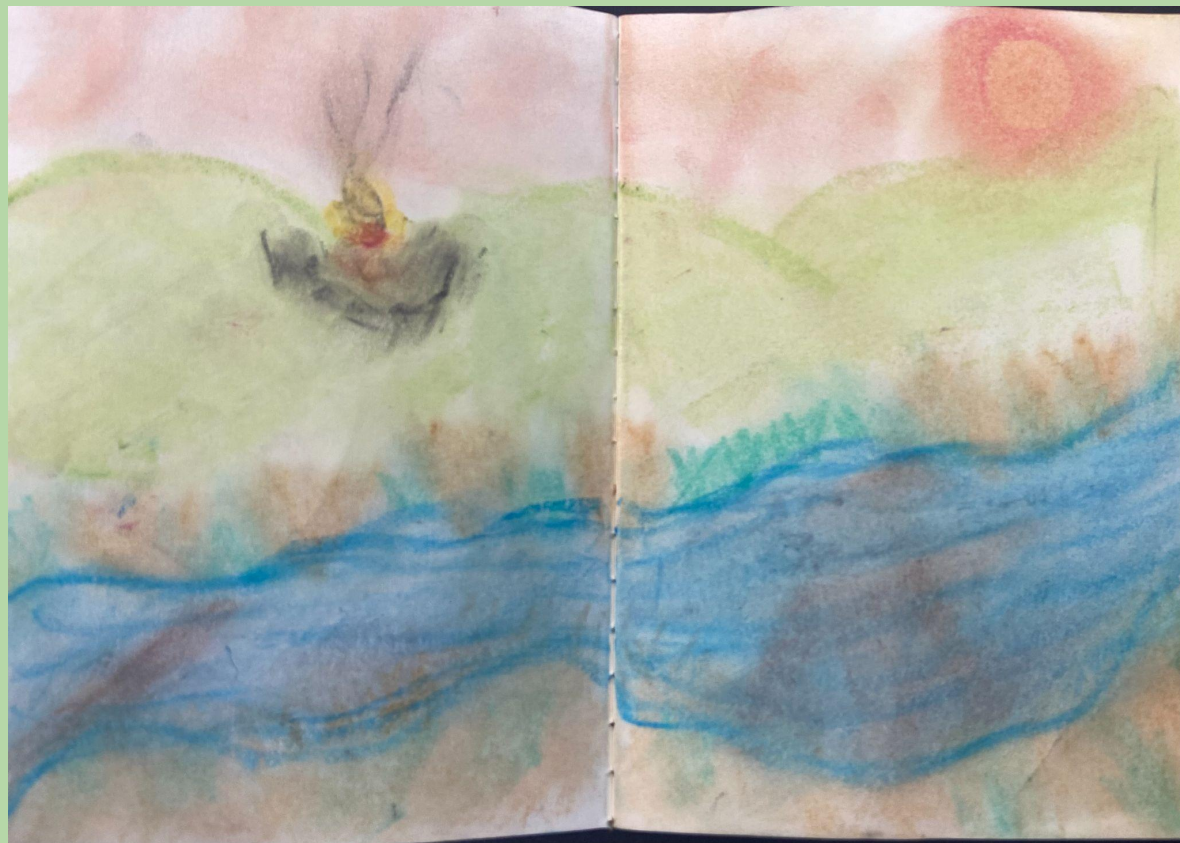

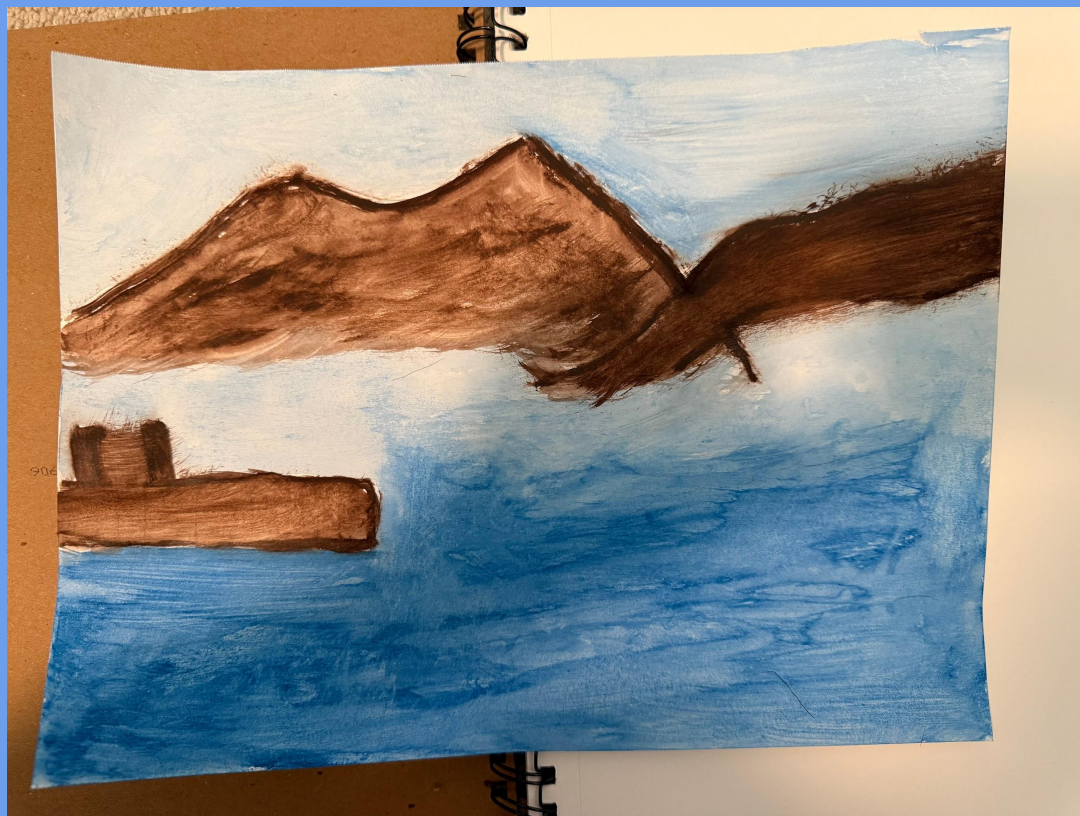


Skokomish River -

The Lyre River, flowing from Lake Crescent to the Strait of Juan de Fuca, has long been connected to the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe, who relied on its rich salmon runs for sustenance and cultural practices. With European settlement came logging and infrastructure development, altering the landscape and disrupting ecosystems. Yet, the river remained a place of connection between people and nature, past and present. Human development impacted its flow and wildlife, but recent conservation efforts reflect a growing respect for its natural and cultural significance. The Lyre reminds us how deeply land and water are tied to human stories and responsibility.
