It needs to be typed, double spaced, with 1" margins, and stapled. In addition, please read *Making Sense of the Troubles*, introduction and Chapter One (pp.1-25) only, to get yourself started.

Assignment for Week Five: Read *The Irish Way* (Barrett), page 157-292. In addition, read "Krapp's Last Tape" by Samuel Beckett (*Modern and Contemporary Irish Drama*) together with "On Samuel Beckett" (pp. 517-539). Each of you needs to go online and find one relevant piece of information about any of the following topics: Theater of the Absurd, Brendan Behan, Samuel Beckett, 1950s/60s Ireland, and Irish prisons. Type up what you have found, list its source, put your name on the paper, and come in prepared to read and discuss what you have found to others in small group discussions. The point of this assignment is to fill in gaps of your understanding about what it means to exist in a postwar world, and how people responded to that world. Your essay on Irish America is due on Friday, February 17, (e-mailed as a pdf) so start now! Do not include materials from Week Five; it's just about Irish America. Refer to the cheat sheet too!

FINAL NOTES: If you are traveling to Ireland in spring quarter, you are expected to arrive at Oideas Gael in Gleann Cholm Cille no later than Saturday, April 29. This means that you can leave here as soon as you if you want, but definitely should leave the United States by April 23. The remainder of your deposit of \$1000 (total deposit: \$1500) needs to be uploaded to your evergreen.edu/studyabroad account by April 10 – the end of Week Two of spring quarter. Note: if you leave in March, make certain that you have excellent raingear and an *endless amount of money*, as Ireland is not only cold and rainy at that time of year, but also quite expensive. The village of Gleann Cholm Cille is quite small and everyone knows where Oideas Gael is. Fly into Dublin and take McGeehan's bus north to the Gleann on the morning of Saturday the 29th. It should cost about 20 to 25 euro. You are expected to **return to class on Wednesday, May 31st** so that you can participate in an intensive gotta-get-the-paper-done workshop that will result in a 20+page essay about Ireland, about your year...and about your life. The paper will be due to Sean as a pdf by e-mail on Wednesday, June 7.
