The most commonly cited locations for the curse of the children of Lir are Lough Derravarragh (Irish: Dairbhreach) in the modern County Westmeath in the north of Ireland, the Straits or Sea of Moyle, located between Northern Ireland and Scotland, and the "Western Ocean", often singling out the small island of Inishglora (Irish: Inis Gluaire) off the coast of Erris, County Mayo.



7The Children of Lir is an Irish folktale in which four children are curred by their stepmother to spend hundreds of years in three successive locations in the form of swains; her only innercy is to leave their the power of speech and singing.

The Children of Lir are a widely embraced, almost mationalistic artistic motif in Irish and broader "Celtic" culture. Above is a depiction by Scottish painter John Duncan (1866 -1945) and to the right is Irish sculptor Oisin Kelly's interpretation, displayed in the Durblin Remembrance Garden.
